Link Letter from the Vicarage

I've never been to Athens – but I know that it is a city steeped in history and culture. It's a city famous for its thinkers.

When St Paul visited there (recorded in Acts 17) he met some of the locals to talk about the meaning of life.

Three hundred years earlier in Athens there had been two very



prominent philosophers who gathered followers around them. They were called "Epicureans" and "Stoics." Their influence was still keenly felt by Paul. **Epicureans** believed that there was no God. They believed the world was random and the best we could hope for in human life was to get as much happiness as we could - because we'd all soon be dead. It might have been Epicureans who coined the catchphrase "Eat, drink, for tomorrow we die."

Stoics on the other hand thought that if there were no God, and that the world was intrinsically meaningless, the best we could hope for was to become free from all human emotions and be resigned to the direction the universe choose to take us.

When Paul got into conversation with members of these groups, they found that they had some common ground about the meaning of life. Neither Epicureans, Stoics nor followers of Jesus believed that the meaning of life could be contained in a religious building no matter how grandly it had been built – whether the temple in Jerusalem or the Parthenon in Athens.

But for Paul, the key determining fact in the whole of human history was the resurrection of Jesus – which had happened just a few years earlier. It changed Paul for ever.

It is still the resurrection that makes all the difference. There are many things that no one understands. But God has made his redemptive purposes clear for the world in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

Many people today (without knowing it) are Epicureans or Stoics. They would say that the best we can hope for is to maximize our happiness or to become immune to our pain. I believe that this is understandable, but actually untrue.

I want to invite you to our Sunday morning services in this new year. In the weeks leading up to Easter we are doing the **Alpha Course** in our morning services. Many of the churches in Salisbury are also sharing in a **Zoom Alpha** (Wednesday evenings – contact me for details). We are united in proclaiming that, in Jesus, God still answers the big questions of life. Meeting Jesus is an invitation to life.

Christian Aid was founded in 1945. The first annual Christian Aid week was in 1957. In 2021 Christian Aid week raised £5 million despite the pandemic. The total from our parish was almost £2,000. Christian Aid is the official relief and development agency for 41 Christian churches in the UK and Ireland. It is a Christian organisation but works to help people of faith and no faith. It works in more than 50 countries in South and Central America, the Caribbean, Asia and Africa.

For every £1 raised:-


- 43p helps long term sustainable projects managed by trusted local partners (not governments)
- 35p goes to disaster and humanitarian emergencies, sometimes channelled through DEC (the Disasters Emergency Committee)
- 8p goes to campaigning for justice and tackling climate change, plus education
- 14p goes to fundraising

Tackling climate change is intrinsically tackling poverty.

A Case Study – Afghanistan

Afghanistan has suffered more than 4 decades of internal conflict with foreign involvement, poverty, a COVID-19 pandemic and take-over by the Taliban. In addition there has been the worst drought for 27 years. There has been an economic collapse and rising food prices plus a near breakdown of health services. People are hungry and at least 8 million are on the brink of famine this winter. Christian Aid are working with two or three trusted local partners, whose identity is protected, in four different areas. Some 17,000 food packages have been distributed and as a result 850 pregnant women, new mothers and their infants have received nutritional support.


50-DAY GUIDE

I'm Praying for You – 40 days of praying the Bible for someone who is suffering By Nancy Guthrie, 10Publishing, £6.99

When we hear that a friend is struggling, it can be easy to say, 'I'm praying for you', but harder to know what you can actually pray!

Through forty carefully chosen Scripture passages, Nancy Guthrie opens up the wealth of scripture to teach us how to pray for those who are hurting. She shows us how the Bible provides us with a vocabulary for prayer that enables us to ask God to achieve what He intends in and through suffering. Nancy teaches us to see how God's purposes are revealed even in our darkest days, and encourages us to pray for His will to be done in difficult situations.

Each chapter includes a passage, a short explanation, and a prayer for your friend. Using the QR code at the end of each prayer, you'll be able to load and send a personal text message to the person you're praying for so that he or she will know not only that you are praying, but exactly what you are praying.

OUT AND ABOUT IN THE PARISH -

A BURIED CANNON AND A MEMORIAL STONE

You may or may not have noticed a large upright stone set in the line of the hedge on the A345 opposite Old Sarum Castle. It was originally erected in 1967 by Master Masons (Freemasons) between Old Sarum and the Beehive roundabout.

The writing on the stone is rather strange and largely indecipherable but says: "In 1794 a line from this site to Beacon Hill was measured by Capt. W Mudge of the Ordnance Survey as a base for the triangulation of Great Britain."



What was so special about that? The date is important, as, at the time, England was anticipating a French invasion. There was an urgent need to map the south coast and thereafter to extend the map to cover the rest of the country. Captain William Mudge, a second lieutenant in the Royal Artillery, was the Ordnance Survey's second most senior official at that time. He had been appointed Deputy Director of the Survey on its foundation in 1791.

Mudge chose this site at Old Sarum to make the first baseline for his maps. He selected Beacon Hill, which is approximately 7 miles north east of Old Sarum, as the other end of this baseline and, using just his theodolite and two metal chains, he laboriously determined the distance to be 36,574feet (11,253 metres). To mark the exact position of the start of the Old Sarum end of the baseline, a cannon was buried in the ground, muzzle up. The end of this can sometimes still be seen today in the field behind the stone. The cannon is commemorated by the Ordnance Survey on their maps, as "Gun, End of Base" to this day.

THANK GOD FOR THE SONG OF THE BLACKBIRD

During the first Covid lockdown in 2020 a lot of people commented that they had, for the first time, really begun to appreciate birdsong. Perhaps this was because the world was a quieter place or maybe it was because we all had a lot less to occupy us when we couldn't go to work or school, or even to most of the shops. Whatever the reason, we could hear the birds singing loud and long – and it made our hearts glad.



To me, the most beautiful song is that of the blackbird, with the robin a close second. Most of us will have a blackbird or two in and around our gardens, since they are still fairly common garden birds. The males have pitch-black plumage and a yellow bill, also a yellow ring around each eye. The females are a slightly spotted brown. They eat worms, insects and fruits and prefer to nest in shrubs and bushes. Mostly they skitter about the garden, stirring up soil and leaves (sometimes making a terrible mess!) uttering a "chack chack" alarm call if frightened.

But early in the morning and, also towards the end of a long summer day, the males seek out a high perch and sing to proclaim their territory. Then all around you can hear the most beautiful, mellifluous song, which may go on for ten minutes or more without repeating a single phrase. It is well worth stopping to listen to enjoy this free recital: it never fails to cheer. So let us thank God for the song of the blackbird.

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The Clewer initiative – County Lines

One form of Modern Slavery that has grown during the last 18 months, and seems to have thrived during Covid restrictions, has been County Lines. For this reason, we focussed attention on this subject during 2021, providing training to many youth workers, police, local authority staff and church workers. We felt that parents and carers of young people should also be informed and so during the County Lines Police Intensification Week in October we ran a short awareness raising session for Mothers' Union members. We have decided to provide extra sessions in January, February and March for anyone who might be interested and have children/grandchildren.

MODERN SLAVERY In Children

DID YOU KNOW?

- in 2019 almost half of victims of Modern Slavery identified in the UK were exploited as children
- of those over half were British nationals
- children are never able to give informed consent to engage in exploitative activity



- Behaviour not typical of their age.
- Have no friends their own age.
- Have no access to education.
- Have no time for playing.
- Persistently missing from home and / or school.
- Decline in school performance.



- Unfamiliar with the local area.
- Unsure of where they live.
- Live somewhere inappropriate.

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• Withdrawal and / or sudden change in personality or behaviour.

SPOTTING

THE SIGNS

- Unwilling to explain their whereabouts.
- Found out of area and / or travelling to locations they have no obvious connections with.
- Travel unaccompanied by adults.



- Engaged in work that is not suitable for children.
- Unexplained money, clothes, accessories or mobile phones.
- Receive excessive texts or calls.
- Have multiple phones and / or sim cards.
- Gang association or isolated from peers.


