Dear Friends,

What is the best piece of advice you have ever been given?



"Never argue with a stupid person, they'll drag you down to their level and beat you with experience." Mark Twain. "Never, never, never give in." Winston Churchill. "If you want the rainbow, you've gotta put up with the rain." Dolly Parton. "Be the change you wish to see in the world." Mahatma Gandhi. "If you haven't got anything nice to say, don't say anything at all." My Mum.

I've been offered plenty of advice over the years, most of which I am grateful for. But recently I heard a familiar piece of advice that I am sure we've all heard a hundred times over – "just be yourself."

It has become a bit of a mantra of our times. "Be yourself" "follow your heart" "be true to yourself" "just be you".

Upon hearing it recently it made me stop and think. I can understand the sentiment but when you reflect on it, is it actually good advice? Will we find the answer to our questions and longings inside of us? Are there treasures to be found in each of us if we dig deep enough? Will we find the guidance and direction we need from looking inwards?

Writing in The Times recently the Bishop of Kensington used the analogy of artichokes and onions to explain further, 'We are encouraged to find our true selves hidden within, like a cook preparing an artichoke, peeling away the rough leaves to find the hidden tender heart inside.'

'Yet what if we are in fact more like onions than artichokes? What if, when we peel away the expectations of others, the roles we play in society, when we get to the centre, there is nothing there? What if there is no mysterious "self" waiting to be discovered, no essence of "me".'

When Jesus was asked the question "What is the greatest commandment?" he didn't say: "Be yourself." He said: "Love God and love your neighbour." Christian wisdom is that paradoxically we find our true self when we lose it, by being turned, not inwards in self-obsession, but outwards in love for the God - who made us and our neighbours - who need us.

This is the invitation of Christian faith: the invitation to lose your crippling self-interest and learn to love God and your neighbour – the person God has placed next to you, whoever they are – and to become truly happy in the process. You and I are onions, more flawed than we realised but loved far more than we ever dreamed.

Messy Church - What's That?

Messy Church – should I bring an apron? Some wet wipes? Just how messy are we talking here?

You may have seen the distinctive red 'splat' Messy Church logo around – after all the movement involves over 500,000 people in countries all over the world! Hope Church's Old Sarum and Longhedge Messy Church has been running since 2013. Messy Church often involves some physically messy activities (not an occasion for your Sunday best), but the 'mess' is really more about the fact that human beings aren't very tidy on the inside. We come together as less-than-perfect people and learn and grow together in a relaxed, fun setting.

Every Messy Church group is a little different, but all hinge on five core values: **Hospitality** ensures a warm welcome to all, and we emphasise the goal of eating together (when possible). This is a church for **all ages** where we do things all together. Our congregation mostly consists of families with pre-school and primary-aged children, but you don't have to come with youngsters. We look for opportunities for everyone to get involved in leading or helping with activities if they express an interest – young or old!





Most of the time in our session is taken up by **creativity**, be that art, craft, construction, play, music, experiments... every theme can be explored and enriched through the creative gifts that each of us possess. Messy Church is a community full of **celebration** – celebrating the significance of every individual in God's eyes, and having a wonderful time together.

Right at the heart of everything we do is Jesus. Because we're **Christ-centred**, Messy Church is more than just a craft club. Through Bible stories we get to understand more clearly who Jesus is and what our relationship with him truly means. Action songs and craft take-homes help the message seep into our lives. The loving 'big family' atmosphere we experience at Messy Church give us a taste of the Kingdom of God on earth!

Mission Focus:

Salisbury Women's Refuge

The Salisbury Women's Refuge is a large house providing secure accommodation for women who have been subjected to domestic abuse. This is also the name of the charity that runs it. This charity was founded in 2005, as a successor to a "Mother and Baby" unit. It is not specifically a Christian charity, but it is supported by the Diocese, who own the house and let the charity use it rent free; they also nominate one of the Trustees who oversee the charity.

Accommodation. The house is a large Victorian building, with a more modern extension. It provides 12 bedrooms of varying sizes, for single women and those with up to 3 children; each family has to share a single room. There are shared bathrooms and toilets, a large and recently refurbished kitchen, and communal spaces including a residents' lounge and a playroom. The house has a garden with some play equipment for children and garden chairs and tables for adults.

Staff. The charity employs a manager, 4 key workers, a book-keeper, a housekeeper and a caretaker – all women, except the caretaker. We used to operate 24 hours a day, but financial pressures meant that we could not continue to do this, and the Refuge is now staffed from 08.00 to 20.00 weekdays, with a nominated staff member on call during the rest of the time. Governance is by a board of up to 9 Trustees (we are 8 at present).

Services. We provide secure accommodation, but also support and assistance to the residents who come to us. Ladies are referred by the police or by social services, and we normally do not accept people who live locally (it would be too easy for a perpetrator to find them). We help with getting children into school, with debt counselling when necessary, we liaise with local social services, and, using a recognised formal course, we try to prepare the ladies so that they can move on confidently to their own accommodation in due course. A normal stay in our Refuge is a few months.






Immeasurably More: Flying for the Way-Maker By Liz Parker, 10Publishing, £9.99

Bible Stories Every Child Should Know By Kenneth N. Taylor and Jenny Brake, 10Publishing, £16.99



THANK GOD FOR......SPRING BUDS AND SHOOTS



(On this page we like to celebrate and give our thanks to God for some of the small, often overlooked, things that can bring a smile to our faces even in the darkest of times)

I must confess that, like Monty Don, I don't much care for winter. It's dark, often cold and gloomy and there are almost no flowers. Certain shrubs, such as viburnum, sarcococca and witch hazel, manage to brave the cold and wet, pushing out small but beautifully scented blooms in the depths of winter, but most plants hunker down into dormancy at this time of year.

But at the end of January or the start of February there's a change. The bulbs planted last autumn are at last making an appearance in the form of green shoots and, even if there are as yet no flowers, there is the expectation that there soon will be crocuses, daffodils and tulips to gladden the heart. Snowdrops are usually the first on the scene and there is always a thrill to see the very first one to open.

As the soil slowly warms in the early spring sunshine, swelling buds are also appearing on the trees and shrubs. The hellebores and wallflowers too are on the verge of flowering. But reserve a smile for the plants that have become confused by climate change and seem to be flowering at totally the wrong time. As I write there is a cowslip in the garden in full flower – a full 3 months early – and very welcome it is. So let us thank God for the spring buds and shoots that lift our spirits each year!

OUT AND ABOUT IN THE PARISH......STATUE OF SIDNEY HERBERT



Tucked away in Victoria Park, next door to the children's play area, is a statue that was once prominently displayed in Guildhall Square. Apart from the name – Sidney Herbert – there is nothing to say who this statue commemorates or anything about his life. In fact he was one of the Pembroke family and ran the Pembroke estates from Wilton House for most of his adult life. He was also president of the Salisbury Infirmary in Fisherton Street between 1842 and 1861.

Herbert entered the House of Commons as a Conservative MP for a division of Wiltshire in 1832. He held minor offices under Prime Minister Sir Robert Peel and was responsible for the War Office during the Crimean conflict. He was a friend of Florence Nightingale and during the Crimean War he asked her to lead a team of nurses out to Scutari to improve conditions for the troops there. He and Nightingale led the movement after the war for Army health and reform of the War Office: indeed his help was key in enabling her to become the stuff of nursing legend. But the hard work this entailed led to the breakdown of his health and in 1861 he had to resign from government office: he died soon after, in August of the same year.

In 1863 a statue of Herbert was installed in Guildhall Square, where it remained until 1953, when it was removed to Victoria Park to make room for the Queen's coronation celebrations. Another, more famous, statue of him can be seen in Whitehall, near to the Cenotaph and adjacent to a statue of Florence Nightingale.



What's on at St Francis


