

Dear Friends,

Spring is springing. I wonder, are you still finding any of the gifts you received at Christmas useful? I received a very practical gift this year; by December 2023 my sock drawer had descended into chaos, the pairings gone awry, with holes everywhere. So, when my wife asked what I would like for a gift, I replied that my Christmas would be made by an overhaul of black socks. And I'm happy to say the improvement is enduring into the Spring.

The Home Alone movies have become family Christmas staples. Christmas Eve traditionally ends with us gathered around the ingenious slapstick of Home Alone 1. We then watch one a day, through the franchise. Seeking an antidote to the slapstick (which after a while lost a little of its novelty), my wife and I searched for something else to watch. We happened upon the Tolkien movie. The film charts how Tolkien developed a love of words during childhood, with his mother reading him and his brother adventuresome stories by the fireside each evening. The interest became lifelong, with Tolkien inventing his own languages and going on to study and teach language. The film ends with reference to Tolkien's later success as a fantasy writer ("In a hole in the ground, there lived a hobbit"). The film has many dramas - an on-off-on relationship, the peril of the Battle of the Somme in which Tolkien fought. And from all of this, in the end a whole new world emerges through Tolkien's writing; lands and characters are brought to life through his imaginative prose and poetry.

The power of words is demonstrated by their ability to trigger our imaginations. Words are powerful in other ways, they can have a great effect in others' lives, for good or ill. The bible's book of proverbs contains lots of wise sayings collected and written by ancient Israel's greatest king, Solomon. One of these says 'Kind words bring life, but cruel words crush the spirit' (Proverbs 25:11) This is so true. A helpful piece of advice I heard as a teacher was 'notice the pupils doing it right.' I found this was often effective, pointing out good behaviours and attitudes usually led to their increasing. As days lengthen, and a little more sunshine gets in, let's use our words to bring sunshine in too – for 'kind words bring life'.

The walkthrough story, beautifully curated by Graeme Brown, included photographs, artefacts and labelled Bible readings to allow people to experience the journey of Jesus.


















The exhibition culminated in an Empty Tomb space, which provided a calm space to reflect.











MISSION



visited Child of Hope way back in 2012. At that point there was a halfbuilt nursery/primary school on site catering for many children in the slums of Namatala, Mbale, in eastern Uganda. In the twelve years that have the build has completed, a secondary school has help added (with the been donations from St Francis), and a nursery school has been established in another district.

Child of Hope helps one child from each family that they support which far more families ensures impacted: over 650 and counting. Because there is no healthcare or social care provision in the slum, Child of Hope steps in to help provide this support. Their team conducts home visits, provides counselling, and offers training for parents/carers, along with school nurse services and local clinic care if needed. They also provide food for the most vulnerable children. And it does not stop there: micro-finance projects help mothers start small businesses, ranging from sellina charcoal and rice to running local-style restaurants and produce stalls at the local market. These businesses in turn enable the mothers to invest in their own families; leading to better housing, nutrition, and education for all of their children.

Our family enjoys watching the videos, particularly when we see Julius, a teenage boy that we sponsor. His incredible dance moves are easy to spot!

I first met Julius as a quiet 6 year-old, all those years back when I visited Child of Hope and have written and received letters ever since. Now I have children of my own, our whole family enjoys writing him letters. I asked Julius to share a few words with you: "Child of Hope has helped me very much. It has provided food to my family members whenever we lacked. It has provided me with studies. If it was not for Child of Hope, I would not have even learnt perfect English and would not have the dream of being a vet. I would not have the confidence I have now." Like hundreds of others. Julius is quite literally a child of hope

- 10) Write three kind notes and leave them around your home, your school, church, or youth group.




The reason for these Secret Missions of Kindness is not just because being kind is good for us, the Bible also teaches us that kind thoughts and words are very important, but what we DO also matters:

IT'S NOT YOUR TURN




I have chosen to emphasize this book and hopefully persuade people into reading it via selecting 3 quotations as follows.

MINI EGG CHEESECAKE

Ingredients

For the base

250g/9oz chocolate digestives

80q/2³/₄oz unsalted butter, melted, plus extra for greasing

For the filling

680g/1lb 8oz full-fat cream cheese, at room temperature

90g/3½oz icing sugar

1½ tsp vanilla bean paste

320ml/11fl oz double cream

320g/11½oz sugar-coated chocolate mini eggs, roughly chopped, plus extra to decorate

For the chocolate nest

30g/loz Shredded Wheat cereal

70g/2½oz dark chocolate, broken into small pieces

 $15g/\frac{1}{2}$ oz salted butter

Method

To make the base, line the bottom of a 20cm/8in springform or loose-bottomed cake tin with baking paper and lightly grease the sides. Add the biscuits to a food processor and blitz until fine. Alternatively, add them to a food bag, seal and bash with a rolling pin. Pour the biscuits into a bowl and stir in the melted butter. Tip the biscuit mixture into the tin and use the back of a spoon to press down firmly and evenly. Place the tin in the fridge to chill.

To make the filling, place the cream cheese, icing sugar, vanilla and half of the double cream in a large bowl and beat until smooth and thick. Stir in the chopped chocolate eggs. In a separate bowl, whip the rest of the double cream until it forms stiff peaks. Fold this into the cream cheese mixture. Pour the filling into the tin and level the top. Leave to chill in the fridge for at least 6 hours or overnight.

To make the chocolate nest, crush the wheat cereal in a bowl and set aside. Set a heatproof glass bowl over a saucepan of gently simmering water, making sure the water does not touch the bowl, and add the chocolate and butter. Stir occasionally until the chocolate is completely melted. Pour the chocolate onto the wheat cereal and stir until completely coated. Line a small bowl with cling film and spoon in the chocolate nest mixture, pressing firmly up the sides to create a nest shape. Place in the fridge to chill until solid.

When ready to serve, remove the cheesecake from the tin. Unmould the chocolate nest and place it on top. Fill the nest with mini chocolate eggs, letting some spill over onto the cheesecake before serving.



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


